5.4 Details of student support mechanism for coaching for competitive examinations (If any)

Pre GPAT test was conducted for third year and fourth year B.Pharm students. 52 students appeared out of them top 10 from 4th year and top 5 from 3rd year were selected for GPAT mentoring.

Full syllabus and subject wise books were suggested to all students including GPAT: A Companion, which contains more than 5000 MCQs and solved question papers of GPAT of last 8 years, MH-CET, entrance exams of RGUHS Karnataka and drug inspector exams.

Four classes were arranged per week for students, covering topics for GPAT exam and 2 hr/week for clearing doubts.

Promo code was given to students for using Pharma glimpse app which contains more than 2500 MCQs, GPAT concepts, mock test paper for GPAT and NIPER.

MISSION


To provide the students a sense of history, an understanding of values and ethics, an appreciation of human creativity and an analytical inquiring mind.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- The ICT is used to its maximum along with CWQIP for maximum beneficial effect to the student community.
- Students are supplied with the information about the chapters to be learnt in advance.
- This has helped the students in being aware in advance about the subject being taught.
 This measure helps the students in enriching the learning capability with more confidence
- The SASP and GSDP ensure the enhancement of learning capacity of individual students. In order to help the students to do well in GPAT, specialized coaching classes are conducted.
- At the beginning of the course, first students are guided and helped to improve their English proficiency.

6.11 Activities and support from the Alumni Association

PESCP Mega alumni meet was organized on 26th Feb 2017 in Kuvempu Sabhangana at Hanumanthanagar campus.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

All the teachers are individually allotted around 20 students for mentorship for the entire course.

Individual teachers interact one to one with students to do a SWOC (strength, weakness, opportunities and challenges) analysis to groom them based on their capabilities, so that they are able to excel both in academics and extracurricular activities.

On a regular basis, parents are informed about the student performance, activities, any short comings etc.

The mentor is required to maintain a CV of individual student from the beginning and continuously update till the student completes the course and is employed.

i. Remedial Coaching Classes

These classes are specially conducted for students of first year Pharmacy course. Over a period of time, it has been observed that not only the number of failures in subjects is reduced to a great extent among the entry level students, but also the number of drop outs is reduced because of an early academic and moral support. and special coaching classes for slow learners through Student Academic Support Program

- ii. Teaching faculty encouragement: The encouragement provided to faculty in the form of
 - a) Incentives @ 10% of the grant received.
 - b) Sponsorship for presentation of papers in seminars/ conferences and workshops.
 - c) OOD for participation in seminars/ conferences and workshops
 - d) The encouragement during the last 10 years has resulted in the receipt of several grants from various funding bodies. This has increased the publication output and has contributed to the development of our laboratories and enhanced the institution's visibility..
- **iv. Mentor System:** The Mentoring System introduced to monitor student progression both in academics and help students deal with issues related to life on campus, gives guidance related to personal issues. Each member of the faculty is assigned about 20 students and the same teacher / mentor will continue till the completion of the course. Documentation with student details has been designed by the College to keep track of the student's growth and development on campus. Each student is required to meet the mentor in a one-on-one session at least three times every semester. If the mentor feels that the mentee requires additional help, he/ she is recommended for appropriate further action. The mentor also guides students on matters relating to higher education and careers. The mentor also identifies students who need financial assistance and directs and assists them for availing scholarships and other assistance.
